Some may have a history of trauma, such as physical or sexual abuse or neglect, which contributes to the mental health problem. These persons need services such as ongoing medication management (prescription, evaluation, and monitoring), case management, and/or periodic support contacts. With the benefit of such services, they are usually able to live relatively independently and have good potential for recovery and increasing success in community living. Without ongoing supports and services, however, they can be at a serious risk for relapse and for much more costly treatment, including intensive crisis intervention and psychiatric hospitalization."</p>
