

Reductions of 30-day readmissions were not projected to decrease because CBHH's include the flexibility of very brief length of stay based on the consumers needs; and not necessarily indicative of inadequate community-base service alternatives or poor discharge planning. This is one of the ways that CBHH's do not function like the old institutional state hospital model where an admission typically had at least a two month length of stay. The SMHA has concerns that this measure, as defined, is not an adequate reflection on Minnesota's efforts to improve its community mental health system, and use short term community psychiatric hospitals.

20A	The federal definition of "state hospital" includes the new state-operated 16-bed community-based behavioral hospitals (CBHH's). Reductions of 30-day readmissions were not projected to decrease because CBHH's include the flexibility of very brief length of stay based on the consumers needs; and not necessarily indicative of inadequate community-base service alternatives or poor discharge planning. This is one of the ways that CBHH's do not function like the old institutional state hospital model where an admission typically had at least a two month length of stay. The SMHA has concerns that this measure, as defined, is not an adequate reflection on Minnesota's efforts to improve its community mental health system, and use short term community psychiatric hospitals.

ADULT MENTAL HEALTH ACT Minnesota Statutes 2009, Chapter 245

245.462 Definitions

Subd. 20. Mental illness.

- (a) "Mental illness" means an organic disorder of the brain or a clinically significant disorder of thought, mood, perception, orientation, memory, or behavior that is listed in the clinical manual of the International Classification of Diseases (ICD-9-CM), current edition, code range 290.0 to 302.99 or 306.0 to 316.0 or the corresponding code in the American Psychiatric Association's Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders (DSM-MD), current edition, Axes I, II, or III, and that seriously limits a person's capacity to function in primary aspects of daily living such as personal relations, living arrangements, work, and recreation.
- (b) An "adult with acute mental illness" means an adult who has a mental illness that is serious enough to require prompt intervention.
- (c) For purposes of case management and community support services, a "person with serious and persistent mental illness" means an adult who has a mental illness and meets at least one of the following criteria:
 - (1) the adult has undergone two or more episodes of inpatient care for a mental illness within the preceding 24 months;
 - (2) the adult has experienced a continuous psychiatric hospitalization or residential treatment exceeding six months' duration within the preceding 12 months;
 - (3) the adult has been treated by a crisis team two or more times within the preceding 24 months;
 - (4) the adult:
 - has a diagnosis of schizophrenia, bipolar disorder, major depression, or borderline personality disorder;
 - (ii) indicates a significant impairment in functioning; and
 - (iii) has a written opinion from a mental health professional, in the last three years, stating that the adult is reasonably likely to have future episodes requiring inpatient or residential treatment, of a frequency described in clause (1) or (2), unless ongoing case management or community support services are provided;
 - (5) the adult has, in the last three years, been committed by a court as a person who is mentally ill under chapter 253B, or the adult's commitment has been stayed or continued; or
 - (6) the adult (i) was eligible under clauses (1) to (5), but the specified time period has expired or the adult was eligible as a child under section <u>245.4871</u>, <u>subdivision 6</u>; and (ii) has a written opinion from a mental health professional, in the last three years, stating that the adult is reasonably likely to have future episodes requiring inpatient or residential treatment, of a frequency described in clause (1) or (2), unless ongoing case management or community support services are provided.

CHILDREN'S MENTAL HEALTH ACT Minnesota Statutes 2009, Chapter 245

245.4871 Definitions.

Subd. 6. Child with severe emotional disturbance.

For purposes of eligibility for case management and family community support services, "child with severe emotional disturbance" means a child who has an emotional disturbance and who meets one of the following criteria:

- (1) the child has been admitted within the last three years or is at risk of being admitted to inpatient treatment or residential treatment for an emotional disturbance; or
- (2) the child is a Minnesota resident and receiving inpatient treatment or residential treatment for an emotional disturbance through the interstate compact; or
- (3) the child has one of the following as determined by a mental health professional:
 - (i) psychosis or a clinical depression; or
 - (ii) risk of harming self or others as a result of an emotional disturbance; or
 - (iii) psychopathological symptoms as a result of being a victim of physical or sexual abuse or of psychic trauma within the past year; or
- (4) the child, as a result of an emotional disturbance, has significantly impaired home, school, or community functioning that has lasted at least one year or that, in the written opinion of a mental health professional, presents substantial risk of lasting at least one year.

The term "child with severe emotional disturbance" shall be used only for purposes of county eligibility determinations. In all other written and oral communications, case managers, mental health professional, mental health practitioners, and all other providers of mental health services shall use the term "child eligible for mental health case management" in place of "child with severe emotional disturbance."

Subd. 15 Emotional disturbance.

"Emotional disturbance" means an organic disorder of the brain or clinically significant disorder of thought, mood, perception, orientation, memory, or behavior that:

- (1) is listed in the clinical manual of the International Classification of Diseases (ICD-9-CM), current edition, code range 290.0 to 302.99 or 306.0 to 316.0 or the corresponding code in the American Psychiatric Association's Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders (DSM-MD), current edition, Axes I, II, or III; and
- (2) seriously limits a child's capacity to function in primary aspects of daily living such as personal relations, living arrangements, work, school, and recreation.

"Emotional disturbance" is a generic term and is intended to reflect all categories of disorder described in DSM-MD, current edition as "usually first evident in childhood or adolescence."
