Interpersonal: Severe inability to establish or maintain a personal social support system. Lacks close friends or group affiliations. Socially isolated. Lacks age appropriate social skills. 6. Role Performance: Frequent disruption of role performance and individual is unable to meet usual expectations. Persistent behavior problems. Failure, suspension or expelled from school. 7. Socio-legal: Inability to maintain conduct within the limits prescribed by law, rules and strong mores. Shows little concern for consequences of actions. Delinquent acts and/or frequent contact with law enforcement. 8. Self Care/Basic Needs: The ability to care for self is considerably below expectation. 9. Caregiver Resources: Caregiver has difficulties in providing for the child's basic needs or developmental needs such that there is a negative impact on the child's level of functioning. Note: Children with a primary diagnosis of developmental disorders are excluded from this definition. Individuals may show less impairment if they are on medications or involved in other treatment services that reduce the symptoms of the illness but moderate to severe impairment in functioning would result with discontinuation of the medications or current treatment.</p>
